CSCF will utilize this funding to provide a range of career development services to 4,000 Orange County residents impacted by COVID-19. Ms. Ramos, GrayRobinson (CSCF's attorney), commented that Mr. Ushkowitz, Orange County Government and Ms. Plinske, Valencia College, have the option to abstain but it is not required, since CSCF is receiving a grant from Orange County and not contracting out from either party. EMPLOYMENT COST INDEX – June 2020

Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 0.5 percent, seasonally adjusted, for the 3-month period ending in June 2020, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. **Wages and salaries** increased 0.4 percent and **benefit costs** increased 0.8 percent from March 2020. (See chart 1 and tables A, 1, 2, and 3.)

Chart 1. Three-month percent change, seasonally adjusted, civilian workers, total compensation





Chart 2. Twelve-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted, civilian workers



Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 2.7 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020 and also increased 2.7 percent in June 2019. Wages and salaries increased 2.9 percent over the year and also increased 2.9 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2019. Benefit costs increased 2.2 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020. In June 2019, the increase was 2.3 percent. (See chart 2 and tables A, 4, 8, and 12.)

Compensation costs for private industry workers increased 2.7 percent over the year. In June 2019, the increase was 2.6 percent. **Wages and salaries** increased 2.9 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020 and increased 3.0 percent in June 2019. The cost of **benefits** rose 2.0 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020 and increased 1.8 percent in June 2019. (See charts 3 and 4 and tables A, 5, 9, and 12.)

Employer costs for **health benefits** increased 1.9 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020. (For further information, see chart 3 and www.bls.gov/web/eci/echealth.pdf.)

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic Impact on June 2020 Employment Cost Index

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) reference date was June 12, 2020. Response rates for June were comparable with prior releases, and no changes in estimation procedures were necessary. Chart 3. Twelve-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted, private industry workers





Chart 4. Twelve-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted, private industry workers



Among private industry occupational groups, compensation cost increases for the 12-month period ending in June 2020 ranged from 2.1 percent for management, professional, and related occupations to 3.4 percent for service occupations. Within **industry supersectors**, compensation cost increases ranged from 1.9 percent for education and health services to 3.6 percent for leisure and hospitality. (See table 5.)

Compensation costs for state and local government workers increased 2.7 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020, compared with an increase of 3.0 percent in June 2019. Wages and salaries increased 2.6 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020 and 2.5 percent a year ago. Benefit costs increased 3.1 percent for the 12-month period ending in June 2020. The prior year increase was 3.6 percent. (See chart 5 and tables A, 7, 11, and 12.)

Chart 5. Twelve-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted, state and local government workers



TECHNICAL NOTE

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) measures the change in the cost of labor, free from the influence of employment shifts among occupations and industries. For information on survey concepts, coverage, methods, nonresponse adjustment, and imputation see *National Compensation Measures Handbook of Methods* at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/ncs/home.htm.

Sample size

Data for this reference period were collected from a probability sample of approximately 25,500 occupational observations selected from a sample of about 6,300 private industry establishments and approximately 7,700 occupational observations selected from a sample of about 1,400 state and local government establishments that provided data at the initial interview.

Standard errors

To assist users in ascertaining the reliability of ECI series, standard errors of all current quarter not seasonally adjusted 3- and 12-month percent change series are also available, see www.bls.gov/ncs/ect/ectvar.htm and the database query tool at www.bls.gov/ncs/ect/data.htm. Standard errors provide users a measure of the precision of an estimate to ensure that it is within an acceptable range for their intended purpose.

<u>Historical listings</u>

Historical listings are available at www.bls.gov/ect/#tables. The continuous occupational and industry series listing uses the Standard Industrial Classification Manual and Occupational Classification System series from 1975 through 2005 and the North American Industry Classification System and Standard Occupational Classification from 2006 to the present. It provides the official series deemed continuous after the change in classification systems.
